

So - what about it? A challenge! Leave out a forgettie - and let me know next Christmas if it helped you keep alive the Joy - even in the darkest days.







Pastoral Care in The Upper Kennet

The Benefice is blessed with very many people who care for their friends and neighbours in line with Christ's teaching 'love thy neighbour as thyself'. Much of this is practical in nature, including emotional support in times of crises but inevitably there will be some parishioners who are not being visited or supported.

With our two Licensed Parochial Assistants (LPA's), Claire Stiles and Graham Kitchen, we have been discussing the various ways in which the spiritual dimension of pastoral care can be enhanced and grown alongside the existing pattern of support - but not in any way replacing it.

Under the auspices of our priest in charge, it is proposed that Claire and Graham will act as Pastoral Care Co-ordinators and will, among other things:

Establish who is visiting whom and how often Monitor that anyone who is ill, infirm, housebound, vulnerable or distressed is covered and that nobody falls through the net.

Ensure that intercessions across all the services in our Benefice include people who have asked for public prayer.

One of the key issues of knowing how and when to offer pastoral care is prompt communication about people in difficulty - initial communication should be made by telephoning the office (01672 861786), or an LPA or a churchwarden (the contact numbers are shown elsewhere in this magazine).

Home communion

As part of this pastoral care plan, it is our intention to re-establish the offering of Home Communion; from talking to many people in the villages it is clear that there are several who cannot get to church and would welcome the opportunity of a home communion visit. Please contact the office if you would like a visit, or you know of anyone who you would like us to contact.

Prayer Circle

It has also been made known to us that there are parishioners who are ill or housebound who would be interested in being involved in an organised prayer circle. They would undertake to pray at a set time each day for different aspects of the church community and the world, using a simple prayer cycle card. UKN Advice tips no 2

Are you struggling with your energy bills this winter?

It's Big Energy Week from Jan 16th-21st when there will be a coordinated effort to let consumers who are struggling with rising energy bills know about all the help that is available and the steps they can take to save money on their energy bills. (For details see www. bigenergyweek.org.uk).

Move to an online tariff if you can and pay by direct debit-its usually cheaper;

Ask your supplier if you can move to a cheaper tariff;

Use a price comparison site to find a cheaper tariff from another supplier BUT be wary about savings promised by switching as there may be costs involved and the savings don't always materialize; Make sure your bills are based on actual meter readings;

Always tell your supplier if you are going to need help to avoid arrears building up; they have a duty to do what they can and they may have trust fund which can help with arrears;

Check out what help there is to make your home more energy efficient (eg by calling the Energy Savings Trust (0800 512012) or the Council's Home Energy Efficiency Officer who can give advice on energy efficiency and grants (0300 456 0100).

A good response about Barn Owls, one the end of November near North Farm and Two at Shaw. I also saw one on a post the evening of Dec 3rd on the back road from Boreham to Lockeridge.

A Red Kite over the car park at the Who'da on Dec 10th, it circled around for a good 5 minutes before heading towards West Overton where another was seen on Dec 12th near the Bell Inn then later at E.

A dragonfly at Lockeridge on Nov 28th, a wasp at E. Kennett on Dec 8th was probably a Queen looking for somewhere to hibernate as only the Queens survive the winter.

A large flock of Starlings numbering between 8-10,000 at E. Kennett feeding on a stubble field giving a fantastic display when the took flight. Good numbers of Fieldfare and Redwing are beginning to strip the berries on the Hawthorn and Rowan.

As the weather gets bleaker the birds are beginning to come back to the gardens, on frosty days make sure they have access to fresh water. Robins especially like porridge oats but wagtails and Finches like it





West Woods Archaeology Project

West Woods is an ancient, semi-natural oak and beech woodland that once formed part of the medieval royal forest of Savernake, and represents an important component of the natural and historic landscape of the region. West Woods sits on the chalk overlooking the Kennet Valley, a landscape characterised by a diverse settlement pattern of villages, hamlets and farmsteads. The area is well known for its early history, a history that has influenced the organisation of the landscape we see today. Archaeological earthworks abound in the region, including deserted medieval settlements, prehistoric field systems, burial sites and the

enigmatic Wansdyke, not to mention the great prehistoric monuments of the Avebury World Heritage Site. Recent work by the Wiltshire Archaeology and Natural History Society (WANHS) has revealed the existence of previously unknown archaeological sites within West Woods, sites that reflect how the woodland was utilised through the ages.

A project is being developed which intends to examine the archaeology of West Woods and its hinterland in greater detail. This project will seek to involve local people in archaeological research, investigating the history of the woodland and settlements in this part of the Kennet Valley, focused on the parishes of Fyfield, West Overton and Preshute.

The project intends to expand on the work already carried out by WANHS using a range of techniques, including aerial photographic transcription, earthwork survey, architectural investigation, archival research and archaeological excavation. There will be an opportunity for local people to be involved in every stage of the project, from deciding what to investigate through to participating in the survey and excavation work. This is a project that hopes not only to enhance academic knowledge, but also to help people write the history of their local area whilst learning new and valuable skills



Aibileen, her best friend's housekeeper, is the first to open up, to the dismay of her friends in the tight-knit black community, but soon more women come forward to tell their stories. Unlikely friendships are forged and a new sisterhood emerges, but not before everyone in town becomes unwittingly and unwillingly caught up in the changing times. A movie to inspire, to make you cry, laugh, feel sad, angry, and hopeful, all at the same time. A definitely "must see" movie.

15th April MY WEEK WITH MARILYN

The story of the extraordinary encounter between Laurence Olivier and Marilyn Monroe in London in 1956 for the making of *The Prince and the Showgirl*. Astonishing cast: Kenneth Branagh as Olivier, Michelle Williams as Monroe, Judi Dench as Dame Sybil Thorndike, with Zoe Wanamaker, Derek Jacobi and, Dominic Cooper. Michelle Williams is extraordinary, turning Ms Monroe into a layered, complex character, a woman desperately wanting to be loved, accepted, and good at her job. The vulnerability, the mannerisms, the voice are pitch perfect. The movie is similar in tone to *The King's Speech*, helped by a beautiful score and wonderful costumes. The wardrobe department deserves a nomination, as do the writers.
